Celebrating 27 years of Dedicated Service

The Board of Directors is proud of the services that Three Oaks has provided for the past twenty-seven years for women and their children who have suffered from domestic violence. Our shelter is a safe haven for those brave women and their children in transition. As well, Three Oaks provides a 24-hour crisis telephone line, empowering counselling services, groups for women and children, and public education seminars. To support these services, we have outreach offices in Belleville, Trenton, and Centre Hastings. Many lives have been changed for the better because of these services.

While we celebrate the work of Three Oaks, we are mindful of the many women and children who remain in situations of domestic abuse.

We are pleased to announce that our shelter at Three Oaks is now completely accessible. Our new lift provides access to all of the residential areas. We have a ramp for wheelchair accessibility, and our kitchen has been modified for easier use by women with mobility challenges. The Board of Directors expresses their appreciation to the Staff of the Shelter for their extra care to ensure the security of the building while this extensive work was completed.

Three Oaks is excited to announce that we are nearer to our strategic goal of Second Stage Housing. This housing would assist women and children to move from temporary shelter at Three Oaks to a safe, longer term environment free of violence. Our next step is to purchase property for Second Stage Housing this coming year. The financial support from our community has helped to bring this dream to a reality.

The year has brought important changes to the staffing at Three Oaks. We congratulate Lorri Harrison on her appointment as Shelter Services Manager, and Jennifer Loner on her appointment as Training and Education Coordinator. We welcome these ladies as they begin their new roles at Three Oaks.

We are most grateful for the many donations and financial support that we have received. Some of the monies were used to purchase new playground equipment for the children. Personal items and toys have been greatly appreciated by the women and children in our shelter. I would also like to acknowledge the Ministry of Community and Social Services for their ongoing support for our services.

On behalf of the Board of Directors, I wish to extend our appreciation to our staff who works tirelessly for women and children suffering with domestic violence. Our building is more than a shelter, it is a “home” for our clients because of our caring staff. Our outreach staff is to be commended on their strong advocacy for women and children in situations of domestic abuse, and their dedication to breaking social isolation.

I have been supported these past three years by a Board of Directors that has shown vision, dedication and caring. These exceptional women and a gentleman have given generously of their time, talents, and commitment. The devotion displayed by these wonderful people is pivotal to guiding Three Oaks into 2012.

5. Create and maintain housing, non-profit childcare, training — NOW!
6. Provide fair access to justice for women.
7. Hold violent men accountable for their actions.
8. Stop criminalizing and psychiatrizing women.
9. Demand secure funding for women's organizations.
10. Listen to survivors and women's advocates — they are the experts!

Report from the Executive Director – Pam Havery

The past year has continued to be a time of growth and transition at Three Oaks. Our agency provides emergency shelter in Belleville and community based counselling services across Hastings and Prince Edward Counties to women and their children who have experienced violence. Equally important, we provide support, hope and confidence to these women and children.

We welcomed Jennifer and Lorri to their new permanent positions at Three Oaks. As well, we are pleased to have Bonny, Erika, Justine and Kaci join the Relief team.

Staff have participated in very worthwhile and effective training opportunities. The facilitated interactive workshop at the annual retreat was developed specifically for our staff. These professional development days are very effective in encouraging stronger working relationships.

The Ministry of the Attorney General is providing funding in communities in Ontario for Family Court Support Workers. Three Oaks has secured funding for a part-time position which will begin November 1st.

One-time capital funding was made available to us for accessibility upgrades and the installation of a new lift. This has allowed for the shelter to be wheelchair accessible once again. Our thanks to Lynette Cumming, Program Supervisor with the Ministry of Community & Social Services, for her support and advocacy on our behalf.

Three Oaks is proud to collaborate with and participate locally in many committees, most noteworthy, the Quinte Coordinating Committee against Violence. Working together strengthens our collective capacity to provide support and services to women and their children. Additionally, it allows us to work collaboratively to address systemic barriers.

Our community came together to plan social action events, including the National Day of Remembrance & Action on Violence against Women, International Women’s Day and Take Back the Night. I am a member of the Board of Directors of the Ontario Association of Interval & Transitional Houses. As a member of OAITH, we work with other women’s shelters, to raise awareness about violence against women on a national level.

Three Oaks has moved forward in its plan to develop Second Stage Housing. SEED funding from Canada Housing & Mortgage Corporation has allowed for the development of a Business Plan. The agency has also begun to establish a Fund Development Strategy. Both of these exciting projects will improve our services.

The Belleville community continues to show signs of its support and belief in the work of Three Oaks. Thank you to all those community members, groups, organizations, sister shelter agencies and women’s advocates who contribute their resources and time. Again, a special thank you to the folks at Royal LePage ProAlliance Realty for their ongoing fundraising efforts for Three Oaks.

Thank you to the board and staff for your dedication and hard work. I am fortunate to work with such committed and caring individuals.

To the women and children that we work with; your strength encourages us to provide the best services we possibly can. As we look to the future, we do see women and their children living free of violence.

SUPPORT

Women's Service Workers

Three Oaks provides a warm and inviting home-like atmosphere for women aged 16 and older and their children who are fleeing abusive relationships. They are welcomed into Three Oaks for safe, temporary emergency shelter, safety planning, crisis support services, rights information, supportive counselling, skill development and advocacy assistance.

Individual safety plans are developed with the woman that reflect her personal needs and choices. Supportive counselling, skill development and advocacy assistance provides women with the tools to become empowered and to understand their rights.

Mothers are supported in their parenting skills with the assistance of the Children's Service Worker to help their children heal from the effects of witnessing violence. The Children's Service Worker also facilitates groups for the older children and provides activities and a playroom with a variety of fun and educational toys.

Our Crisis line provides immediate support, safety planning and referral services via telephone and TTY devices 24 hours a day 7 days a week.

Highlights from WSW Worker

- Helping women by providing positive outlets for self care and communication.
- Seeing positive change in someone's self confidence and seeing them recognize and embrace their power as women.

Children's Programs

Children's Program In House

The Children's Service Worker is available for the children that stay in the shelter. She provides counselling to the children as well as parenting help for the mothers. Amy, the CSW states, "Being the Children's Service Worker in the shelter is in my opinion one of the most rewarding positions. I have the opportunity not only to meet the children, but to interact with them, and get to know each one on an individual basis. The children are each so different, but have more in common than they know." The CSW also provides opportunities for the children to have fun by taking them out of the shelter on special trips such as to the beach, movies and the park. The shelter has a playroom designated for the children. Also this year, new equipment was purchased so that the children have their own space outside as well.

Children's Outreach Program

The Children's Outreach Worker provides one on one counselling as well as group counselling for children that have witnessed domestic violence. This service is based in the community. Leah, the Children's Outreach worker describes an encounter she had with a young teen. She states "At a group for preteen boys in Madoc, the topic of discussion was Why Women Stay in Abusive Relationships. After going through the different barriers a woman may face when leaving an abusive relationship, and focusing on those that especially affect rural women, an 11 year old boy stated to the group, "So it's just like dropping the woman off in the desert". When I asked him what he meant by that he replied, "Well she's free but good luck surviving". I was amazed by his insight and knew we got the message across."

CONNECTION

Community Counselling Program

This program offers service to women in the community, who have experienced abuse in their lives. The program provides short term goal – focused supportive counselling as well as individual and group counselling sessions.

The counsellors provide court support, crisis intervention, referrals to other services, safety plans and case conferences.

We have office space in Belleville, Trenton, and Madoc with counsellors working in these areas on a regular basis. We also have the use of office space in Stirling, Marmora, and Frankford, when the counsellors have appointments booked.
